Have you seen the Bowerbirds around the Centre?



## National Reconciliation Week May 27- June 3

#### What is National Reconciliation Week?

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

The dates for NRW remain the same each year; 27 May to 3 June. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey— the successful 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision respectively.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

The National Reconciliation Week theme for 2024, **Now More Than Ever**, is a reminder to all of us that no matter what, the fight for justice and the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people will —and must —continue.

There have been many moments in Australia's reconciliation journey that make us want to turn away. But when things are divisive, the worst thing we can do is disengage or disconnect.

Rowena, Elli, Hetty, Cobi, Violetta and Deb are currently undertaking their Marte Meo Practitioner Training with Licensed Marte Meo Supervisor, Italia Parletta. Over the past few years, many of the educators at CaFE Enfield Children's Centre have benefitted from this extremely valuable training that first originated in The Netherlands over 40 years ago and is now used all around the world. It encourages a new way of recognising how many opportunities there are in daily interactions and small 'moments' to build connections with and between children. It supports children to find their own strengths and focuses on the importance of communication and empathy when building relationships.

"I have learnt about respectful relationships, responsible leading and reflective practice. I will be aware of slowing down during my interactions with children and rather than questioning them, I will encourage their ideas as I continue to name their ideas and feelings." – Hetty



# Deciding the Rules Together: assessing risk for the fort & climbing net

We have recently been updating some of our risk assessment documents and we value the children's input in this process. Children have a right to express an opinion and to contribute to decision-making in matters that affect them. This is supported by the United Nations Rights of the Child (Article 12) and the Australian Early Years Learning Framework.

Lee held a meeting with a group of children from the Karra & Kangkulya rooms to discuss safety and rules for the fort and the climbing net. It was a fantastic discussion during which the children listened to each other and built on each other's suggestions. At times there were some differing ideas and we kept discussing to reach a shared decision. Lee kept minutes of the meeting and read them out at the end of the meeting to make sure nothing was missed.



- No climbing with toys or bags (or anything in your hands)
- No jumping off the next (or the fort)
- Only 2 people can climb on the net at a time
- Only 4 or 5 people allowed on top of the fort at a time

#### An educator needs to be near the net!

When you want to climb down the net:

- Check no-one is coming up
- Lay on your tummy at the top
- Go down feet first
- You must be facing the net with your tummy
